COTTERSTOCK and GLAPTHORN.

COTTERSTOCK is a parish in the Hundred of Willibrook, and Oundle Union, 2 miles north-north-east from Oundle. The living is a discharged vicarage, untied with Glapthorn, value £91, in the archdeaconry of Northampton, and diocese of Peterborough; the Hon. and Rev. Thomas Clotworthy Skeffington, M.A., is the incumbent. The church, dedicated to St. Andrew, is an ancient structure, with a square tower. It was at Cotterstock Hall, in this parish, that the poet Dryden composed his fables, and here he spent the two last summers of his life. The population, in 1851, was 176. The manor belongs to the Dowager Countess of Westmoreland.

COTTESBROOKE is a parish and neat village in the southern division of the county, Hundred of Guilsborough and Union of Brixworth, 12 miles north-east from Daventry, 12 south-west from Kettering, 9 north from Northampton, 14 north-west from Wellingborough, 10½ south from Market Harborough, 7 south-east-by-south from Welford, and 75 from London, watered by the river Nen. It contained, in 1851, 252 inhabitants, and extends over an area of 2,747 acres 3 roods 16 poles of land, arable and pasture. The church is dedicated to All Saints, and comprises the nave, chancel, one aisle and entrance porch, with a square tower, containing
