The writer of this is the forth Son of Simon Holmes, of clay cross, Derbyshire England.

I was born at clay cross, in a street called by the name of monkey Park, on the 10th of July 1867,

And in July 1868. I was one year old, Then this took place, My Father was a miner, He and two more left there home, to go to work, and when they got to the pit bank, The tub in which they go down the sheft into the mine: It was waiting for them, And it was called an hopper, and as they go down in this hopper, they have one leg in sade the hopper, and one leg out side the hopper, It had a clives-spring on the hopper and it was broke and tied with a peice of string, And as soon as they was all ready to be lewerd down the shaft, and the knock was given to go, The string broke and the hopper and the three men fell to the bottom of the shaft, And when the men got to them, they found that one was dead, and the other two was very badley hurt.

At this time there was four boys in our family, william, Simon, Thomas, and John, And as I was the youngest, I san not remember seening my Father was lie, which he nover did walk any more, But in that day and time there was no school board, so you can see that we did not got to go to school very much.

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But as time past by my Father's Brother, he did walk again and he also went to work again.

In the year 1877, My Father got in touch with the Formers and he was made a member of that church, And he built a place for them to worship in, but it had no gas to light it up with, and its light was condies at that time of the day.

But as soon as the people got to know that my Father was a Normon, then the church sunday school got too hot for us boys, and we had to find another sunday school, as we soon got the name, ald mormons.

Then we went to the free church school, we was not there very long before the teachers began to call us old mormons. ly Father bought an old poncy and cart, and he took us round clay cross and clay lane and new market and other vilages and he bought rage and bones old brass and old iron and rabbits skins.

Now this free church sunday school, was run by an old man, by the name of grunday, so they gave it the name of old grundays chapel, and it was run by old men at that time of the day.

One sunday morning one of the old men was having a nap, and while he was having his nap, the preacher was telling us how Satan, was going about like a rearing Lion, just at that time the old man was coming out of his nap, And he oried out are bless him.

But as the time went by there was some Missionarys belonging to the Reorganised-Church-of-Jesus-Christ-of-Latter-Day-Saints who came to claycross.

And my Fatger got in touch with them, And he very soon found out that he had got into the wrong church, And when he saw it, He very soon came out of it, And he was made a member of this Church.

In the year 1880, My Father was Ordained An Elder, and then he was made the Pastor of the Branch, and he work very hard for this branch, to help it to go along, why because he loved the work of his God, And also to a speak of the love of the Son, of the living God, And also of the gospel of Jesus Christ, and he loved the truth of it, Why because his heart was made glad while he was speaking about it to the people.

And then I was Ordained a Deapon, in the clay cross branch, And we went out into the streets and into the vilages to preach the gospel to the people, and to tell them of the beautiful message of love and salvation, And also to tell them to repent and be baptized for the remission of your sins.

And we also told them of the beautiful words of Peter, a good Minister, for the gospel of Jesus Christ.

Then Peter, said unto them, repent and be haptized every one of you in the name of Jenus Christ, for the remission of your sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost, for the promise is unto you and to your children, and to all that are afar off, even as many as the Lord, our God shall call.

I was thinking about this place Sutton-in-Ashfield, in the year 1872, there was a good branch in it, but the mormons got into it, and they very soon distorted it.

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But there was one good man in that branch, who stood by the church, he was an elder, and his name was John Hill, but as time went by he left, sutton and he came to a little vilage about four miles away to work and he got work on the reads to look after them.

Now this vilage which Bro John Hill, came to live in was Tibshelf inDearbyshire, but we did not know that he was a Latter-Day-Saint, at this
time, but I often past by him on the road when he was at work, but as 8
I have been apeaking of the gespel in this place for years, the new that I was a Latter-Day-Saint, and as we went round the vilage, we soon
found out he was telling the people all about the mospel as we was and
the people paid why we have got another mormon come to live in Tibshelf,
but we soon found out that he belong to our church, and as we got in
touch with him, we soon found out what a loving bro, he was and a fine
man two, he loved to tell the people all about the gospel, and the love
of God, and also all the people who like to ask him about his church.

Now this Bro, came to clay cross to see us, he was made a member of thiss branch, but he had along way to walk to the church, he had five miles to walk each way, But he had along way to walk but he was always at his, post, for he loved to tell of the love of God, but he had always some god things to tell us. This man God bless him in his work, why because he loved the work of his Master; He was always ready to tell every body, who ask him about this church, and of the message of love and salvation, and he would try his best to lift you up and bring you hear's to God; and at the same time help to make your heart rejoice with—in you; He—loved all his brothern and sisters; and they all loved him in return, And when he preached to us he never left us with only stubble to feed on; and to nibble at, he had always some nice things for us to eat and drink.

Now if the Ministers of this church, would take more time to study the word of God, more than they do, what would this church be like, Why just what the Master. would have it, to be, If they did this, They would have no time to, go to the picture-shows, and no time to go to the foot ballmatches.

Now Bro, Pitt, He came to clay cross on a Mission about 45, years ago, as my Father had to ride about in a carriage, so we went with him and Bro, Pitt, to preach in a little vilage by the name of Danesmoor'in Englands: He was a nice Minister of the gospel, And I loved to go out with him,

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; : This is another good old immister of the gospel, His Bro, James Caffall, He had always a smile on his face for all of us, and he was so sweet and kind to all of us, one time while he was at clay cross, we had a crate of pots come to our shop, and it was one a dray, and he was helping the men to get it of and it sliped and it knock him down, it might have killed and when he got up he had a black eye, and when my Father saw him, he laugh at him, Bro, Caffall, said why Bro, Simon, you would laugh if it had killed me.

Now while we was preaching in Tibshelf, about 54. years ago, there came out a new paper, from Sutton-in-Ashfield, it was called the Free-Press, and it came in very useful to us at that time, we was able to get this work before the people all round for along way out, and it open up a way, so that we was able to send some very nice letters to the Free-Press.

This is a letter my Father sent to this paper about 54, years ago.

TO THE EDITORA.

Sir will you allow me a short apace in your valuable paper in the interest of truth and slandered innocence, If Joseph Smith had more wived than one, it is most singular that he no family except by his real wife, it is something like it was a few month ago when the present Joseph—Smith went to Utah on a mission, and he was talking to one of the eldered belonging to the Brighmits Church, and the eldered asked young Joseph—Should you like to see one of your Father's wives Joseph said I should, like very much, and the elder took him to the woman and he asked her, are you one of my Father's wives! She said "Yes I am, Joseph said unto her, how old are you and when she told him, how old she was he said why you were not born while my Father was alive.

And this is why I make the bold statements which I do, because they are founded on truth, If Mr Ogden thinks I want to put him in a corner he is greatly mistaken, All I want is the truth to come before the people that they may be propored for the great day of account, Remember you will here we to stand before the bar of God, to give an account of what you are doing, fighting against the work of God.

Now Mr Ogden, investigate the princeiples taught by the Re-organised Church of Jenus Christ, and if you find anything that is not Christ-like, then dome out and expose them to the world, Mr Ogden says he can tell us were the true doctrines of Christ are taught, but it is not by any of the number I mentioned, Twelve hundred Different denomination, and none of them teaching the true doctrine as Christ taught it.

Oh my God; what a state to be in blind leading the blind, and darkness = covering the earth, and gross darkness the minds of the people, God revealing his mind and will to him prophets, Amos Says, Surely the Lord God,

will do nothing, but he revealeth His Secret to his servants the prophets, Yours Elder Simon Holmes, Clay Cross, Derbyshire- England. (Truly)

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Now when Bro J,W,Gillen was in clay bross about 50, years, Sister-Railings Daughter Emily was Blind, And she was at our home at thin time and they came for her, And her nother was going to the meeting and they took her with them, And Bro Gillen administered to her, And she received her sight, this was a grand gift of our God to our Sister.

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Tow the place my Father built foe the mormons to worship in, when he left h thom, they had to got another place, As they wanted it for their own people to worship in, and as there was no gas in it, they had to light it "Up with oandles.

One sunday night when my Father was in charge of the meeting, Bro-John -Hill, was the preacher, and while he was speaking to us, one of the candles got very low, John turned round and said, Simon smuff that camile but, and we all smild at it, but he went on with his preaching, like a good old servant of the Lord.

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And as this work went on in clay cross, we all went round the vilages and "told them the truth of the gospel, and while we was doing this we lost one who was our branch dencon, who was a good help to us in this branch, he loft us and went to live at Sutton-in-Ashfield. And we all mist him, we called. him funny old Bob, But we all loved him, And our Sister who he called our poll, but she was a good sister in this work while she was with us, and we all mint her.

About 1889, Bro W, H, Greenwood, came to live at clay cross, as a mindionary in charge of the Sheffield District

**996**99669000000009996699 And he went to live in Bradley's row in clay lane clay cross, and his wife was very sick, and he had to do a lot of her work, and the wemen in that - row gave the name of joey in the wash tub; but they all liked him and gave him a good namo.

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And then I was Ordained a Priest: And then Bro, Greenwood, He went to live at Sheffield. And as Bro, J, Austin was the District President. were use to help each other, so I went down to help them, and they came to help us in Chesterfield, Bro J Maylor Bro C, Cousins, Bro J, Hool, Bro J, Holmes, we had some very good times on that market place, One time when we was there it was raining very fast and we was singing and are we ye a live, and shall see each others face.

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And as Bro John Hool, and I Bro John Holmes, had a tack to fill in preaching up in yorkshire, and at this time they had a beautiful sunday school, andBro Rool, had to go and see the mothers of these children.

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And he took me along with him, and it would have done you good, to have seen the faces of the mothers who belong to the children, when he went to their doors.

While we was preaching in Chesterfield Harket place, about 40, years ago,

of For the purpose of refuting certain allegations recently made againts at the mormons by an ex-mormon priest named Jarman in the course of a series of lectures recently delivered by him in Chesterfield;

Two Mormon Elders from Utah visited the town on Sunday with the intention of holding two meeting in the Lecture Room of the Stephenson-Memorial Hall, but in consequence of the warm opposition and the rough treatment they received in the afternoon they were glad to abandon the idea of holding an evening gathering although Sup. Emery mustered his force in preparation for any emergency, At the close of the Elder's address a gentleman at the back of the room inquired whether any questions would be answered, The elder replied that they did not answer questions on sundays, The genleman then asked if they would fix some evening durning the week for the purpose, All levers of truth had been invited to the meeting and he was anxious the truth should be elicited.

The two "elders" conferred together, but gave no answer to the question, the audience horeupon gave cheers for Jarman.

The mormons mean-while commencing to sing another hymn, At the conclusion of the meeting a large crowd assembled in front of the Stephension Memorial Hall, It was not thought discreet for the "elders" to leave by the main entrance and they accordingly departed by a back door in Station Lane.

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They were, however, recognised as they emerged into St Mery's Cate, and they were followed by the crowd, many of whom obtaining a supply of sods from the Church-yard was passed, mud and other substances were thrown With a body-guard of police, the elders were escorted along Low Pavement, amidst storm of booing, groaning and hissing, The windows of the house where they lodged were smashed, and the door broken in.

Elder Joseph Naylor, and Friest Henry Taylor and I John Holmes, we were going round to preach the gospel and telling people of the love of God, some times we went to ashover to a little chapel, and in the streets, some times to a little vilage called Morton and to Stonebroom and a lot of other vilages all-round.

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After this Bro H, Taylor and I Priest John Holmes, we began to go to suiton-in-Ashfield, To help funny old Bob, Bro R, Rallings to preach the gospel to the people and the message of love and salvation, and when we went to help him, we had to walk 18, miles each sunday, and Pro Taylor, had to walk 22, miles, each time, but we loved to go and help our brother, And we went a year or too and gave him help.

Now as time past by I was shown: That I was to go and live at sutton, I was returning from work one night, The Spirit said unto me go to sutton:

And as I had my Son Simon with me at this time I said unto him, Simon we have to go and live at sutton, He said Dad we shall not go to live at sutton, But I said we shall, I was thiking about it all the way home, whom we got home and we was having our tea, I said to my Dear Wife we are going to live at sutton, She said unto me, Why I could have told you that two years ago.

But I had to go, So I went to see Bro, Rallings at sutton, but when I got to there home he was away from home and he would not be at home that, day, but sister Rallings had a good look at me, She wanted to know what I had come for, so when I saw that I told her, and then she smiled at me, So then I went into the town, but I did not find what I wanted, so then I returned home, as I thought for good.

Then in a day or two, we had a son come into our family, which made 8 - all to-gether, six, girls and two boys, But still I had to go to sutton, I then made it a matter of prayer, and I said if I find a place I will go; and if I do not I shall stay were I am; so I went to see our funny old Bob; and he was at home this time, And when he saw me said I told, our poll, he was coming to live in sutton, He as come to be my Aaron, for I have seen that he was coming to be with me in this work; for he his, my Aaron in this part of the Lord's vineyard, And I know that I shall, have him to stand by methia as been shown to me.

Now he said come along Bro, Johnny, and let us go and find a place foryou, so we went down to the New cross, and into a street called Redolifestreet.

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In this street we naw a empty house, He said now bro Johnny this house is for you, but I said how do you know, it might have been let to some one else, but he said I tell you it is for you, Then we got to know who belong to it: and we went to see the man, and I asked him if that house was to let, and he had a good look at me, and then he said yes, and he goe we ment back, and had a good look at it, and I saw it was alright for us, so we went back to the man, and I told him I would have it, so we went back to Bro Rallings home, when he went in the house he said are poll bro Johnny as got a house and then she laugh.

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And now I returned home and I told my wife, I had found a good place for us, so now we shall have to go to sutton, our Paby was five wacks old, This was in 1905, whon I went to live at sutton.

This then made two familys, Bro R, Rallings in charge of the work, as we had no branch, but most in our homes, but in a little while after wards, Bro H. Taylor and his family came to live at autton. Then that made three familys in all this made about 17, of us and no branch,

And this branch was Organized in 1905, By Bro John Austin, The District-Prosident, And Bro, W. H. Greenwood Missionary in charge of the Cheffield-District. инплипици

On the 13th of Jumuary, 1907, I John Holmes, was Ordained an Elder in this

branch Sutton-IN-Ashfield, England.
In the General Conference of the Re-organized Church held at Lamoni -Iowa, April 1913, I was appointed to labor in the British Mission.

Just before Dro J.W. Rushton, left England for Americe, We held a weekn , mission in Station-In-Askfield, And I Elder John Holmes was the first, speaker each nightm and we had a very good time.

Now in the year 1906,00t 5th; This came in the papers, and we had it to "fight." "ትዙታያሩና

Mr Joseph F, Smith president of the Mormon Church at Salt Lake City. Now sister Rallings and sister Fanny Willis, they worked hard to keep; this branch going they have done peas and carryed them close on a mile so that they could make us happy on the cold saturday hights some times once the oaks and oxos some times are the and pies cake and, lots of other things, to eat and drink, and all to make these nights happy and so they did, with one thing or another, among them they got to got ther (some were) about £20, pounds, and they bought a plot of land in Fernst; Stoneyford Road, And it was let for gardens till we had to have a place of our own.

We was told how to get the money:And we got from the;Hanchestor-Latter-Day-Saints,Buriel Society;We got £150;Pounds.

Bro G,V,Willis, and a few of us set to work, But the wether was so bad and it began to look as if we was not going to get it up, and we had to fight hard to get it up at all, but we worked hard, and we was able to get it, finehed and it look very nice, and a fine place to take any one into, and a nice place for the sunday school, And then we was able to go dut and, tell the people where we was, and the nice little place we have, And we, went into the town and into the vilages to tell them of the Heautiful of love and salvation which we did.

Now we can return to our Bro G, V, Willis our heartful thanks for the , namer he as looked after this building.

As we went along we had some good times in it, we held our Services and come to-gether in love we had the Spirit of truth with us, and our hearts did rejoice in us, when we had the Spirit of God with us, and we thenknow God for such a Reautiful place.

Now some of the young brethren went out with Bro R, Rallings and I BroJohn Holmes, Missionary, and they took a Hermonium, on a four wheel carriage, which I made for them to go about with us in the street, the players was W, G, Rallings and sister Emily Rallings, She also played for us,
in the Church, Sister M, J, Rallings along with Eister Fanny Holmes was a
good help to us as they took the sunday school scholars, to help us to,
wing this was a good help to us when we went on the market place to proach, And they put on the back of the Harmonium, The Re-organized-Churchof Jesus-Christ-of-Latter-Day-Saints, As they loved to tell the people,
what church they belong too.

"Then some times Bro Armstrong would come along and bring Bro Hathers, with from Hanchester, And they always did us a lot of good, when they came to sutton."

And Bro John Austin, was one of the old timeres, And we loved to see him. This one was a walking and talking Encyclopedia, In Bro, Able Hall, from manchester, he was the one to tell you about the book, of Hormon, we all loved to hear him speak on this book, And he his a very nice preacher took he very often came to sutton, and olay cross, And he gave us some very nice poseph on the Lantern slides, about the same book, And also about Bro, Joseph Smith, And his Bro Hyrum Smith.

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Now while we was at clay eross, Sister Hill, Passed away, and in afor you arb'after Bro John Hill, passed away also. Then my Dear Mother passed a+ way, A few years after My father passed away.

Under all these circumstance and what ever things might have beening all ought to thank our God. For the manner in which our, Bro, G, V, Willie, as been able to pub us such a Beautiful House for to us to worship God: what a grand thing it is to know that we have such a sweet and clean place to come to meet his Son Jesus Christ, WE must be sweet in our hearts and , clean in our minds: If not we can-not please our god in this housest and if we are in this wey we shall neve pass by the lost Sheep:

The clay cross place built for the Church of Cod to worship in ! how when my Father passed away, then the building came to us boys, and ac things went along they was not very good! Then we Simon and John and G.H.Holmes, we gave the church buildings to the clay cross branch, and it set them free.

Now I John Holmes, I am the only one of the ministers left of them who carbe to help to organize this branch in 1905, and I have seen some ups and downs in this branch since it was organized.

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After this Bro C.H.Holmes was Ordained an Elder, and then he was made the Pastor of the Branch, and 1t went on for a while and 1t went flat. 

And then Bro G.V. Willis was again made the branch Pastor, this went on, all right for a while and then some of the members said we ought to have a place a bit bottor than this so that we could bring some of our frice nds to it: So then the Pastor asked how much money have we in the build\_ ing fund, And he was told that we had only £11, pounds in it.

So then the Paster put it before us how we could do it, and it was excepted: The pastor set too work, and we helped him to get the foundations, out for a new olumon; in Sutton-in-Ashfield, If it had not have been for the Pantor G.V.Willia, we never should have been able to get a new church. in sutton;

The pustor got the bricks and we helped him to put the foundations in; But let me tell you how hard it was few him, he had to do his own work in the day-time and this church work at night; be-nides gotting other things for the building of it: But we had one good work-man to help the pastor; this the branch Priest, Bro H, Simpson, he did the mixing of the nortar; will be looked after the bricks as they came in He worked hard Along with the paster got no for it, I; ( nany) . . . . em sure that

god will bless them for the manner in which they did this
